HEALTH ADVICE General advice has been given earlier about avoiding bilharzia, malaria, STD and HIV/AIDS. Although being cool, June is not a high-risk time for malaria, the Zambezi valley is classified as malarial all year round. As well as

prophylactics it is advisable to wear long-sleeved shirts and long trousers in the evenings, and apply an insect repellent.

The *Medical Air Rescue Service* in Harare provides country-wide emergency cover – see http://www.mars.co.zw.

Various websites around the world post satellite images of the cloud patterns over Zimbabwe.

I am trying to find a website and/or email contact for the Department of the Surveyor-General which is the official Zimbabwe mapping agency, although there are also maps produced by a number of commercial publishers, available from book shops.
